## Our Presenters and Panel

**Ian Dunlop** is Deputy Convenor of ASPO Australia. He is an engineer and was formerly a senior international oil, gas and coal industry executive. He has chaired the Australian Coal Association (1987-88) and the Australian Greenhouse Office Experts Group on Emissions Trading (1998-2000), and was CEO of the Australian Institute of Company Directors (1997-2001). Ian is now a Director of the non-profit think-tank Australia21, Chair of Safe Climate Australia, a Member of the Club of Rome and a Fellow of the Centre for Policy Development. He has a particular interest in the interaction of corporate governance, corporate responsibility and sustainability.

**Anthony Perl** is Professor of Urban Studies and Political Science at Simon Fraser University, Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada. He is the author of five books, including *Transport Revolutions: Moving People and Freight Without Oil* (2010). Anthony has advised governments in Australia, Belgium, Canada, France, and the United States on transportation and environmental research and policy development. He is a member of the Board of Directors of VIA Rail Canada and chairs the intercity passenger rail committee of the U.S. Transportation Research Board, a division of the National Research Council. He is also a Fellow of the Post-Carbon Institute.

**Ross Povey** is Director of Planning & Development, City of Stirling, Western Australia. He is an architect and town planner with over 20 years' experience. Ross directed the preparation of the *City of Stirling Oil Risk Strategy*, which was adopted by Stirling Council in 2012.

**Wally Wight** is Senior Strategic Planner - Transport with Moreton Bay Regional Council, Adjunct Senior Research Fellow at Curtin University Sustainability Policy Institute, and Coordinator for ASPO Brisbane. With Professor Peter Newman and Parsons Brinkerhoff, he provided input to a study for Gold Coast City Council in planning to manage the risks associated with oil depletion.

**Jago Dodson** is Director of the Urban Research Program at Griffith University. His work has addressed a range of urban social scientific research problems and has synthesised insights across urban planning, transport, geography and housing studies. Jago's research has produced considerable insight into urban household sector stressors in Australian cities, especially household exposure to higher oil prices and mortgage costs, most notably through the VIPER and VAMPIRE indexes. Jago has over 50 publications on transport, housing, and urban planning.

**Dr Kirsten Small** is a Brisbane obstetrician, gynaecologist, and lecturer in the School of Nursing and Midwifery at Griffith University. She is concerned about the health system's reliance on oil for the provision of services, and will discuss what we should be doing to prepare for the impact of greater competition for dwindling oil supply.

**Liam Wagner** is a Research Fellow in the School of Economics at the University of Queensland. He specialises in energy and environmental economics and policy. Prior to coming to UQ, Dr Wagner worked as a trading analyst in the energy industry, providing electricity market forecasting expertise. In 2008, he was appointed to an Australian government panel of experts to advise on the design and implementation of the proposed emissions trading scheme.
